



# Apprenticeships in Ontario

- Apprentice A trainee who learns a skilled trade by working directly with a certified Journeyperson in the trade
- Apprenticeship A formalized training program ,which combines on — the — job and in-school training resulting in Journeyperson status.
- Apprenticeship and Certification
   Act(ACA). New legislation (1988) applying to service, motive and manufacturing /industrial sectors .All construction trades remain legislated by the older Trades Qualification and Apprenticeship Act (TQAA) of 1964

- Certificate of Apprenticeship- This document shows that an apprentice has successfully completed his/her apprenticeship (required vary according to the TQAA or the ACA)
- Certificate of Qualification This document is obtained when a written exam is completed and passed with a mark of 70%. It identifies a journeyperson.

- Compulsory Trades Compulsory Trades are those governed by TQAA and require that only registered apprentices and licensed journeypersons practice in the trade
- Journeyperson-A skilled professional who has completed an apprentice program by demonstrating competency in specific skills and has completed the Certificate of Qualification or deemed to be equivalent

- Loan for Tools Program A program
   available to first —year apprentices offering a
   loan to help purchase tools and equipment
   needed to preform the trade in which the
   apprentice is registered.
- OYAP- The Ontario Youth Apprenticeship Program allows secondary students to gain experience in the skilled trades.

- Red Seal Program The Red Seal Program endorsement on a journeyperson's Certificate of Qualification confirms that the person has achieved a national recognized level of competency in the trade and is licensed in the skills trades.
- Restricted Trades- Restricted Trades are those governed by the ACA and require that only registered apprentices and licensed journeypersons practice in the trade.

- 10 Red Seal Program e.g. Automotive Painter, Parts Technician ,Truck trailer service Technician

#### Service Sector (35)

• 1 Restricted e.g. Hairstylist

• 34 Unrestricted e.g. Baker ,Chef, Native clothing & crafts artisan

 6 Red Seal Program e.g. Appliance Service technician ,Baker –patissier, Horticultural technician

## Ontario Youth Apprenticeship Program (OYAP)

- Train as a registered apprentice and attend high school to earn credits towards your
   OSSD, at the same time
- Your school's co-operative education program can assist you in finding an employer to teach you a trade of your choice.

#### **OYAP Requirements**

- Recommendation from the principal
- 16 credits completed towards your OSSD
- Have good marks in Math, Science, English, and Technological Studies
- Sign up for two co-op credits in grade 11 and four more in grade twelve
- Commit yourself as an apprentice in grade
   11
